All staff and students will have access to twice weekly lateral flow tests. Students are tested in classrooms on a Monday and Wednesday morning. If a positive result is detected: <u>Staff</u>: will follow the isolation guidance. If a negative result is provided on day 5 and 6, you can return to work on day 6. If you are still testing positive, isolate for 10days and do not test on your return. <u>Students</u>: If a child tests positive, the parent is informed and they come to school to collect their child. The child waits in the isolation room area and follows the same guidance as staff above. The threshold for reporting positive cases to Public Health are; 2 children, pupils, students and staff. Contacts:	 Staff and students who are a contact of a positive case are no longer required to lateral flow for 7 days. However, should you begin to develop one of the 3 main symptoms (continuous cough, high temperature, loss/change in sense of taste/smell), we would advise that you take a lateral flow test. We will continue to ensure our cleaning and hygiene regimes are thorough and consistent. Additionally, all areas will be well ventilated. COVID-19 hygiene advice and posters are displayed in key areas of the school site. Staff to reiterate to Parents and Students (via letter/email/classroom talks etc.) the importance of :- o Hand washing on a regular basis Covering coughs and sneezes with a tissue and disposing of it (Catch it, Bin it, Kill it) Not touching eyes/nose/mouth with unwashed hands All welfare facilities to be checked and cleaned regularly, and ensure a supply of anti-bacterial hand wash soap/surface cleaning agent and paper roll is available. 	

	 Hand sanitiser to be provided to all classrooms. Pupils to wash their hands throughout the day at regular intervals. School cleaning regime is significantly increased to include frequent cleaning of frequently touched items (Door handles/doors/taps/table tops etc.) The DFE have released contingency guidance (see attached). This will ensure we have systems and processes in place, should we have positive cases. 	If all staff and students continue to follow the control measures in place, the risk is low.
Staff feeling unwell and coming into work.	 Staff are aware of the importance of following national guidance, and to stay home if they have symptoms. If a member of staff develops symptoms at school, they go to the isolation room and take a lateral flow test. If the results is positive, they will go home and follow government isolation guidance. If negative, they may continue to work as long as they are well enough. The Isolation room is clearly signed, to prevent accidental access by others. If the window is opened to cool the area then doors into the corridor should be left open to ventilate the area. The radiator in the room should remain off to keep the area cool. Once the child/staff member has left it must be thoroughly cleaned. All horizontal surfaces should be sprayed with SCREEN and then dried using blue paper roll. The surfaces should then be sprayed and left wet and the door closed. Please inform SLT if a positive case is identified in school so that the school's positive case document can be updated. 	If staff follow the guidance and do not come to school if they are symptomatic, the risk is very low.

Providing remote learning and regular contact for students not in school.	 For all students who are at home due to COVID, remote education plans are in place (Appendix 2) As much as possible, we try to ensure that this provision meets the same expectations as those receiving face to face provision. Depending on the child's educational phase, some children have been sent learning packs and some will receive learning via seesaw. 	The risk to a loss of learning is is very very low.

Following the publication of new DFE guidance (released on 24th February) please see the guidance <u>below;</u>

<u>Face coverings:</u>

- Face coverings optional for both staff and students in all areas of school (including communal areas and taking/collecting students from the buses).
- > Visitors are welcomed into school and face coverings are optional.
- > All visitors are advised to take a lateral flow before attending.
- Please ensure that all additional safety precautions continue to be followed, including regular handwashing and sanitising.
- > Always sanitise on the way into school.

<u>Communal Activities;</u>

- All staff are encouraged to use the main staff room. The DT room is no longer a staff room and should not be used for breaks or lunches.
- > Semi-Formal/Upper School assemblies will resume on a Monday morning.
- > 1:1 music sessions with D.O on Mondays will resume.

<u>Testing</u>

- If you are symptomatic for Covid (dry continuous cough, loss/change of taste and smell, high temperature) please stay at home and take a lateral flow test.
- If the test is positive, you will need to isolate for the recommended time. Please inform Georgia and forward a photo to Georgia.
- If you are well, you can take a LFT on day 5. If this is negative you can take another on day 6. If this one is also negative, you may return to school on day 6.
- It is still advised to continue to use lateral flow tests twice weekly for both staff and students. Students will be tested on and Monday and Wednesday within school (where consent is given).
- > For those without consent, we will encourage all parents to test their child at home.

<u>Contacts of a positive case:</u>

- Staff and students who are a contact of a positive case are no longer required to lateral flow for 7 days.
- However, should you begin to develop one of the 3 main symptoms (continuous cough, high temperature, loss/change in sense of taste/smell), we would advise that you take a lateral flow test.

	In the interim:	
4.	 Contact parents or carers of the children/young person affected to arrange for them to be collected. Whilst the child/young person is awaiting collection, they should be moved, if possible, to a room where they can be isolated behind a closed door, depending on the age of the child and with appropriate adult supervision if required. Ideally, a window should be opened for ventilation. If it is not possible to isolate them, move them to an area which is at least 2 metres away from other people. If they need to go to the bathroom while waiting to be collected, they should use a separate bathroom if possible. The bathroom should be cleaned and disinfected using standard cleaning products before being used by anyone else. 	
	In an emergency, call 999 immediately if they are seriously ill such as increasing breathing difficulties, increased coughing which is making breathing difficult or their life is at risk. Do not encourage them to visit the GP, pharmacy, urgent care centre or a hospital.	
5.	Implement infection prevention & control precautions: Good hand hygiene should be implemented before entering and after leaving the setting – see hand hygiene Ensure good ventilation measures are maintained. If a child, young person or other learner becomes unwell with symptoms of coronavirus while in their setting and needs direct personal care until they can return home, a fluid-resistant surgical face mask should be worn by the supervising adult if a distance of 2 metres cannot be maintained. If contact with the child or young person is necessary, then disposable gloves, a disposable apron and a fluid-resistant surgical face mask should be worn by the supervising adult.

7.	Use disposable cloths or paper roll and disposable mop heads, to clean all hard surfaces, floors, chairs, door handles and sanitary fittings, following one of the options below: use either a combined detergent disinfectant solution at a dilution of 1,000 parts per million available chlorine or 	
	 a household detergent followed by disinfection (1000 parts per million av.cl.). Note: if an alternative disinfectant is used within the organisation, this should be checked and ensure that it is effective against enveloped viruses.

Other members of the family (parents/guardians) may also need to self-isolate for 10 days.	
11.	If someone has serious symptoms they cannot manage at home they should use NHS 111 online. Tracing close contacts and isolation	
	Close contacts will now be identified via NHS Test and Trace and education settings will no longer be expected to undertake contact tracing. As with positive cases in any other setting, NHS Test and Trace will work with the positive case and/or their parent to identify close contacts. Contacts from a school setting will only be traced by NHS Test and Trace where the positive case and/or their parent specifically identifies the individual as being a close contact. This is likely to be a small number of individuals who would be most at risk of contracting COVID-19 due to the nature of the close contact. You may be contacted in exceptional cases to help with identifying close contacts, as currently happens in managing other infectious diseases.

<u>St Francis Special School – Remote Learning plan.</u>

At St Francis, we aim to provide parents/carers with a variety of engaging and easily accessible activities to motivate their child/young person at home. We try, where possible, to reflect the varied curriculum offer we deliver in school

EYFS/Pre-Formal

In EYFS/Pre-Formal, Teachers upload a series of activities, using Seesaw, throughout the week. This could be by way of video, web link, pictures or a lesson plan; giving parents the opportunity to personalise the learning to suit their child's needs and environment. Alongside this we post daily tasks, wellness activities, stories and songs providing further opportunities for engagement. We have some very creative and enthusiastic Teaching Assistants, who enhance our remote learning offer. Pupils and parents have been able to enjoy videos from familiar faces showcasing their pets, hidden talents and lockdown adventures. During weekly phone calls, parents/carers can talk about the activities they have been carrying out at home, as well as request additional support. Parents/carers can post pictures and videos of their child taking part in activities using the app, enabling teachers to provide ongoing support via the comment function.

Semi-Formal Curriculum

Pupils following our Semi-Formal curriculum are following bespoke home learning packages. Teachers offer learning packs that focus on personalised learning intentions that are motivational and fun. Teachers also promote independence activities that can be easily accessed using everyday resources in the home. For those families who are connected to their child's Seesaw online learning journal, work is sent electronically straight to the pupil. Where families cannot access work sent electronically, physical packs are sent directly to the home.

Class teachers keep in touch with families on a regular basis. Seesaw provides the perfect opportunity for instant support and feedback on pupil learning. Weekly phone calls are being made to all families with any issues being fed directly back to the Assistant Headteacher.

Upper School

In Upper School students are supported to work from home in a variety of ways. The main way is by form tutor's keeping in weekly contact with parents and students and providing physical 'work packs' that are relevant to the curriculum that the young person follows when they are in school. This will be an Upper Pre-Formal, Upper Semi-Formal or Upper Formal curriculum pathway offer. A vast variety of activities and resources are sent home in the 'work packs' from the many Vocational elements of the students curriculums with a particular focus around the core elements of the curriculum, these being Functional Skills where work is set at the appropriate level to the student's needs, from Entry Level 1 to Level 2, PSHE including RSE and the personal development of Independence. For those students following an Upper Pre-Formal curriculum staff interact with students and parents using the app 'SeeSaw' which allows for a learning journal to be shared of the work created. Additional 'work packs' are then sent home to students on an individual basis following the completion of a 'work pack' at the request from the student/parents following weekly communication. Feedback is given on the completion of the work/activities completed within a 'work pack' either once returned to school via the parents or upon the physical return of the young person to the school building following the full re-opening of the school site.
